FROM THE SECRETARIAT

Dear Friends,

The ACSJC is now preparing for the launch of the 2004 Social Justice Sunday Statement in September. At the same time, Australia is preparing to go to the polls for the 2004 Federal Election.

In this Monthly Briefing, the ACSJC wishes to draw your attention to these events and some associated resources that are available for order and/or downloading from the ACSJC website.

2004 SOCIAL JUSTICE SUNDAY STATEMENT

"Peace be with you - and also with you." As Catholics we hear and say these words every time we go to Mass. But how do we bring this peace to our hearts and to our world?

This year's Australian Catholic Bishops Conference Social Justice Sunday Statement explores that question under the title "Peace be with you – Cultivating a Culture of Peace". Anchoring itself firmly in Christ's gift of Peace to us, the 2004 Statement goes on to ask what Australians can do to cultivate a culture of peace.

It acknowledges that "a culture of peace begins within our own hearts, spreads to our own households and then our communities before it can become an entrenched fact of the larger society's life."

Tragic world events of war and terrorism over recent years have cost the lives of many and caused so much human suffering. Many wonder, "What can I do as one individual to work towards a peaceful world?" In responding to this question, the Statement draws on

the words of Pope John Paul II who has affirmed that peace is not only possible, but is actually a duty.

With courage and hope, we are all invited to start where we can in the work of cultivating a culture of peace.

The Statement highlights important ways in which the gift of peace is shared: through our families; in seeking reconciliation (including National Reconciliation); between religions; in the field of democracy; by spreading democratic and multicultural values; addressing poverty in Australia and overseas; and in the context of national and international security.

Social Justice Sunday will be celebrated on 26 September. The Social Justice Sunday Statement will be launched in Sydney on Wednesday 22 September.

FEDERAL ELECTION 2004 – VOTE [1] NO MORE POVERTY

As the Federal Election approaches, a coalition of Anglican, Catholic and Uniting Church agencies has launched a pre-election campaign to get the issue of poverty back on the nation's agenda. The campaign, "Vote [1] No More Poverty", was launched at Parliament House in Canberra on Thursday 24 June.

The agencies promoting this campaign include: the Society of St Vincent de Paul; Anglicare Australia; Catholic Health Australia; Catholic Welfare Australia; UnitingCare Australia; Conference of Leaders of Religious Institutes; Jesuit Social Services and the Australian Catholic Social Justice Council.

At the launch, the organisers said, "We are making use of our extensive networks to call on all Australians to take up the challenge and help us to make politicians and political candidates aware of this issue. As such, in the lead-up to the next election we are asking all Australians to take the time to write to them or call them and ask... 'Do you care about poverty in Australia and what will you do to address it?'

"In the spirit of the letter to the Prime Minister and State and Territory leaders, signed late last year by the leaders of Christian, Jewish and Muslim faith communities, we too call on all political leaders to halt the shameful divide between the haves and the havenots in this wonderful country".

The aims of the campaign are to raise the level of awareness about the extent of poverty in Australia and to raise awareness that governments have a vital role to play in poverty alleviation. Poverty alleviation is an important issue in all elections in Australia.

The campaign has a website that includes a range of information and resources including: proformas for letter writing; a downloadable poster; and a selection of 'scatter' ads relating to child poverty, Australia's poverty levels compared to other developed nations, health issues, and low-income levels.

CURRENT ISSUES

ACSJC OCCASIONAL PAPER: "THE CHURCH AND PUBLIC DEBATE"

This month, the ACSJC releases the 50th edition of the Catholic Social Justice Series in which Professor John Warhurst addresses the role of the Church in public debate and issues concerned with speaking out in an election year.

Warhurst writes that the Church has a long and often controversial history of public involvement in Australian politics. There have often been counter-criticisms, not just of what the Church has said, but of its right to speak out at all.

The Church at times offends parties across the whole range of the political spectrum as it fulfils its right and duty to speak out from a religious, pastoral or ethical perspective. After analysing recent criticism and warnings from politicians, he deals objectively with charges of lack of expertise and partisanship, perhaps the most serious levelled against those who disagree with a particular policy.

Warhurst presents practical guidelines for ethical and effective Church participation in the public debate, and points out the importance of its independence from government that is sometimes lacking in other organisations.

JULY NEWS MONITOR

CATHOLIC HEALTH REGRETS LABOR MEDICINES ABOUT FACE: Catholic Health Australia CEO Francis Sullivan called the ALP about face over charges for prescription medicines an "astonishing decision given Labor's previously strongly held view that the poor and sick would need to be protected from the proposed new charges".

ASYLUM SEEKER CHILDREN ABANDON LEGAL FIGHT AND NOW FACE DEPOR-TATION: The Bakhtiyari asylum seeker children abandoned their legal battle with the Federal Government, choosing life in the community under 24-hour guard over the "anxiety and uncertainty" of another trial.

LAUNCH OF "NO MORE POVERTY" INITIATIVE: A new coalition of religious social welfare and justice groups called Christian Community Services Against Poverty mounted a campaign in the lead-up to the Federal Election.

ACTIVISTS CALL ATTENTION TO THE MISUSE OF WATER AND NEED FOR CON-SERVATION: The Faith and Ecology Network called on all faith communities in Australia to promote among their members a respectful use of water in both rural and urban settings.

ACLRI URGE CREATIVE WAY THROUGH FEAR: The Australian Conference of Leaders of Religious Institutes resolved to promote a culture of peace and reconciliation in response to a growing culture of fear in our society.

JESUIT ADVOCATE SAYS THERE'S NO GOOD REASON FOR CHILD DETENTION: Fr Frank Brennan told a Sydney rally that the only reasons for keeping asylum seekers in detention are bureaucratic convenience and the government's desire for popularity.

VATICAN OBSERVER ON JOB CREATION'S HUMAN AND NATIONAL DEVELOP-MENT ROLE: The Holy See's permanent observer to the United Nations in Geneva called for a balanced hierarchy of values in the regulation of employment opportunities.

INDIAN PRIEST HIGHLIGHTS DESTRUCTIVE ROLE OF CALL CENTRES: A priest in the Indian business hub Mumbai warned against the social cost to India of western countries including Australia outsourcing their call centre work to contractors in India.

SUDAN CALLED 'WORLD'S WORST HUMANITARIAN DISASTER': Untold thousands of lives will be lost in the Darfur region of Sudan unless civilians are protected from the brutal Janjaweed militia and inter-ethnic fighting, according to Caritas partner Nils Cartensen after he returned from the area.

HUMAN RIGHTS WATCH URGES VIETNAM ATROCITIES INVESTIGATION: New reports that dozens of Christians were killed by government soldiers during peaceful protests in Vietnam's central highlands this Easter have prompted calls for an independent investigation.

JESUIT SAYS OLYMPIC TORCH SYMBOLISES UNITY, NOT NATIONAL COMPETITION: The movement of the Olympic Torch through Sydney and Melbourne, then eventually every other continent on earth, was a call to a sense of international unity, not cheap international competition, said Fr Peter Norden.

TASMANIAN JUSTICE COMMISSION ENTERS FOREST DEBATE: The inherent hostility and divisive nature of Tasmania's forestry debate makes most Tasmanians reluctant to have their say on the issue, according to Tasmania's Catholic Justice and Peace Commission.

CARITAS AUSTRALIA LAUNCHES UGANDA APPEAL: Caritas Australia launched a special appeal to help rehabilitate the estimated 14,000 children who have been abducted by the Lord's Republican Army (LRA) and used as soldiers, labourers and sex slaves in Northern Uganda.

BISHOPS URGE VOTE FOR THE COMMON GOOD: Australia's Bishops issued a statement ahead of the Federal Election identifying some of the challenges now facing the nation and urging Australians to consider their vote in light of the common good.

COMMISSION SAYS SUPPORT FOR REFUGEES IS WORKING: The Executive Officer of Brisbane's Archdiocesan Catholic Justice and Peace Commission has said the its appeals for compassion "are being heard", and that he hoped they would "influence decision makers so that the anxiety suffered by refugees can come to an end".

PAKISTANI CHRISTIAN DIES AFTER PRISON BEATING: For the second time in a month, a young Christian in Pakistan died of injuries after being beaten by fundamentalist Muslims, the Fides news service has reported.

CATHOLIC CALL FOR PROPER ATSIC REPLACEMENT: Two major Catholic bodies issued a joint call for all apolitical parties to ensure that an adequate regional and national structure is in place to represent the needs and aspirations of Indigenous people, following the dissolution of ATSIC.

JULY 4 NATIONAL ABORIGINAL AND ISLANDER WEEK

National Aboriginal and Islander Week, otherwise known as NAIDOC Week, is held in the first full week in July.

JULY 4 ABORIGINAL SUNDAY

Aboriginal Sunday is a time for celebration of a unique and beautiful culture and a time to recognize that much still has to happen in our nation for true recognition of that culture and for a real and lasting justice for all people. Within the framework of celebration and our faith, let us bring together all peoples to once again unite in the struggle to recognize affirm and celebrate Australia's Indigenous peoples and culture. We cannot afford to let the efforts of the Council for Aboriginal Reconciliation fade into the distance before any real and lasting change has been effected, the struggle must continue.

JULY 11 WORLD POPULATION DAY

Nearly half of all people are under the age of 25. About 20 per cent are adolescents between the ages of 10 and 19. 87 per cent of these adolescents live in developing countries. Their educational and health status, their readiness to take on adult roles and responsibilities, and the support they receive from their families, communities and governments will have profound consequences for the future.

An estimated 238 million youth, almost one in four, face the constraints of extreme poverty. A large percentage survive without their parents, or are marginalized for other reasons, including humanitarian emergencies, migration, disability, poor health or family dissolution. More than 13 million children under age 15 have lost one or both parents to AIDS. Many take on the care of younger siblings or live on the streets.

JULY 23 WORLD YOUTH DAY

Organised by the Catholic Church, World Youth Day began in the mid 1980s when Pope John Paul II invited youth from around the world to gather in prayer for peace and reconciliation. It brings together Catholic youth between the ages of 16 and 35 from many countries. Even though the international gatherings happen about every two years, World Youth Day itself is celebrated each year.

In my Message to young people for this occasion I ask them, in this time endangered by violence, hatred and war, to endeavour to witness that it is Jesus who can give true peace to human hearts, to families and to the peoples of the earth.
