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FROM THE SECRETARIAT

Dear Friends.

Pope Benedict XVI's World Day of Peace message, entitled In Truth, Peace, addresses major themes of the search for peace through truth, the rejection of terrorism and the condemnation of worldwide proliferation of arms.

Truth, the Holy Father says, shows us the path to peace, and we find truth by being faithful to God's design for the world. Peace is not simply the absence of conflict; it is "the result of an order planned and willed by the love of God."

"Who and what, then, can prevent the coming of peace?" Lying and falsehood have had "devastating effects on the lives of individuals and nations." False ideology and political systems have "wilfully twisted the truth and brought about the exploitation and murder of an appalling number of men and women."

Everybody yearns for peace, and finding peace means repairing relationships that have been harmed by untruth.

We are all members of the same family and share a common destiny.

We must seek peace even amid the tragedy of war. The Holy Father says that one vital way of doing this is through international law - "one of the finest and most effective expressions of ... the truth of peace." That law must be respected and updated to keep pace with changing circumstances and new military technology.

Terrorism is one of many threats to peace in today's world. Quoting Pope John Paul II, Pope Benedict says that trying to impose belief on others through violence "is an offence against the dignity of the human being, and ultimately an offence against God".

In addition, conflicts, often incited by governments, "still continue to sow tears and death in vast parts of the world." Nuclear arms, too, are a continuing menace, and to depend on them for national security is completely wrong. So is the pursuit of so-called conventional arms, on which countries spend so much money.

The first to benefit from disarmament will be the poor countries, who have been promised development for so long and now rightly demand it.

Finally, Pope Benedict brings us back to the Gospel, which teaches us "to build peace on the truth of a daily life inspired by the commandment of love." He urges us to seek the intercession of the Mother of God to strive for peace now and for the future.

As individuals, in our communities and among nations, we are all members of the same family and share a common destiny. We are all called to "cultivate productive and sincere relationships" - to follow the paths of forgiveness and reconciliation, to be transparent in our dealings, and faithful to our word.

At midday Angelus in St Peter's Square on 26 February, the Pope called for intense prayer and penance during the Season of Lent for peace and for freedom from sectarian conflict in many parts of the world including Iraq and Nigeria.

He said, "The fruit of faith in God is not devastating antagonisms, but the spirit of fraternity and collaboration in favor of the common good. God, Creator and Father of all, will call to an even more severe account all those who shed their brother's blood in his name. May all, through the intercession of the Holy Virgin, again encounter him, who is authentic peace!"

ACSJC BACKGROUND PAPER: STOLEN WAGES - AN OPPORTUNITY FOR JUSTICE?

Tens of thousands of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people worked for government and non government employers during the 20th century. Many of these workers received only a portion of the wage to which they were entitled. The cycle of poverty experienced by a number of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples can be partly attributed to wages not being paid. A large amount of money earned by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander workers remains in the hands of the state. Some measures taken so far to remedy this past injustice have not been adequate.

The issue of "stolen wages" needs to be examined in depth by all Australian governments. It is an opportunity for symbolic and practical reconciliation firmly grounded in the basic principle of justice.

This Background paper provides basic information on the circumstances facing many Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander individuals and families seeking wages they were not paid for years of work. The Paper is available on the ACSJC's website:

ARCHBISHOP SPEAKS UP FOR HUMAN RIGHTS OF SEAFARERS:

Archbishop Silvano Tomasi CS, Holy See permanent observer to the United Nations at Geneva, called on States to ratify a Maritime Labour Convention that will protect the rights of millions of workers.

BRISBANE ARCHDIOCESE WELCOMES MESSAGE STICK: The Pass It On Message Stick was officially welcomed to the Archdiocese of Brisbane at a Eucharist led by Auxiliary Bishop Joseph Oudeman at St Stephen's Cathedral.

SYDNEY BISHOP OUTRAGED AT SLAYING OF REFUGEE: Bishop David Cremin, former episcopal vicar for immigration in the Archdiocese of Sydney, expressed "shock and outrage" over the death in Sydney of Sudanese refugee and father of four, Ruol Deng Atem Agang.

CARITAS RESPONDS TO THE PHILIPPINES MUDSLIDE TRAGEDY: Caritas Australia was quick to act following the Philippines mudslide, which claimed hundreds and possibly thousands of lives.

NZ CATHOLIC STATEMENT SPELLS OUT LIMITS TO FREE SPEECH: In the wake of protests sparked by the decision of local media outlets to publish cartoons of the prophet Mohammed, the Church said that democratic freedoms "must observe boundaries of decency, good taste and fairness".

CARITAS HEAD SAYS ENCYCLICAL OBLIGES CHARITY: Caritas Australia director Jack De Groot said that the second half of Pope Benedict XVI's Encyclical Deus Caritas Est makes it clear that charitable activity for Catholics is not an optional extra.

'REPEAT OF TIMOR' FEAR FOR WEST PAPUA: The atrocities committed by Indonesia against East Timor will be repeated in West Papua if the international community does not take action, according to Sr Susan Connelly of the Mary MacKillop East Timor Institute.

MARCH SOCIAL JUSTICE CALENDAR

MARCH 1 ASH WEDNESDAY: Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of Lent, a time during which we are invited to prepare for Easter and the coming of the risen Jesus into our life and our world. It is a time for personal conversion. Traditionally, there are three ways we can participate in this season of preparation and conversion: through prayer, fasting and giving alms.

PROJECT COMPASSION: Through Project Compassion, we can prepare ourselves by going without some activity or thing (fasting), and giving the money we save (alms giving) to the appeal. Through our prayer, we will come to a deeper awareness of our own need for conversion and a readiness to share what we have with those in need.

Caritas Australia uses the money raised through Project Compassion for its main work of long-term community development which encourages self reliance, for working in partnership with communities at the grass roots level to promote peace and justice, and to respond to emergencies, such as the tsunami in January, 2005.

2006 THEME: COMPASSION IN ACTION: Building a just world involves standing in solidarity with the oppressed. To do this we must act, we must challenge and change unjust structures, we must promote the human dignity of all. We are called to put Compassion into Action. - Project Compassion Letter, Archbishop A. Doyle, Chairman, Caritas Australia

Through Project Compassion, Caritas Australia is promoting the Millennium Development Goals, eight goals aiming to halve world poverty by 2015. In particular, Caritas would like to:

- help the people of Tanzania to access safe drinking water (MDG 7)
- empower Indigenous Australian women in remote communities (MDG 3)
- provide trauma support for the people of the Solomon Islands

- improve human rights and access to education for children in Bolivia (MDG 2)
- help the people of PNG fight against HIV/AIDS (MDG 6)
- assist the people of Aceh to rebuild their lives following the tsunami (MDG 1)

The international community, at the beginning of the new millennium, set the priority of halving the number [of people living in extreme poverty] by the year 2015. The Church supports and encourages this commitment and invites all who believe in Christ to show, practically and in every sector, a preferential love for the poor.

CARITAS AUSTRALIA'S AUSTRALIAN INDIGENOUS PROGRAM: The primary aim of Caritas' Australian Indigenous Program is to work in solidarity with Indigenous organisations. Caritas Australia does this by supporting sustainable development projects that are developed and implemented by Indigenous Australians and which therefore faithfully reflect their needs.

MARCH 8 INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S DAY: Millennium Development Goal 3 aims to promote gender equality and empower women. Here, Caritas Australia is seeking to empower Indigenous Australian women in remote communities. Funding has been provided for Indigenous Women's Councils to come together to share their knowledge, experience, ideas and culture with other Aboriginal women. Elders hold the knowledge of traditional ceremonies and coming together allows them to develop and assert their crucial role in guiding their communities as they deal with contemporary issues and work to maintain traditional life and culture.

Traditional Aboriginal women have a ceremonial life that is secret from men. Women's Law with its attendant rituals, ceremonies, songs and dances must be performed and passed on for the maintenance of traditional life. Coming together for meetings entitles women to influence, direct and maintain the social, political and cultural life of their own communities and indirectly that of the wider Australian community. Meetings provide the opportunity to discuss issues affecting contemporary life such as domestic violence, substance abuse, youth suicide, childcare, and care of the elderly and disabled. They promote the position and status of senior Aboriginal women and expose younger women, including non-traditional women, to the Law so that they can gain an understanding of their heritage and learn what Aboriginal women in other parts of Australia are doing.
