FROM THE SECRETARIAT

Dear Friends,

The beginning of every new year often finds us making resolutions to change and improve aspects of our lives. Perhaps time for reflection over Christmas and the holiday season brings us an awareness of our gifts and an appreciation for the blessings we have received and we seek to respond to this opportunity by making a resolution that matters.

Since the last ACSJC Briefing was published early December, significant events and memorials have occurred, including: the $5^{\hbox{th}}$ anniversary of the detention of David Hicks in Guantanamo Bay, the hanging of Saddam Hussein, World Day of Peace and Australia Day. Each of these may provide us with an opportunity for reflection and a resolve to act.

In late December, Saddam Hussein was executed. The Church was unambiguous in its condemnation of the violent hanging of Saddam Hussein, proof that execution dehumanises not just its victims but its perpetrators.

In a Letter to the Editor of Australian Catholic newspapers, Bishop Christopher Saunders said:

The terrible spectacle of the execution of Saddam Hussein should remind all Christians of the pointlessness and obscenity of the death penalty. The Church's teaching on this matter is clear: we do not have the right to take life as punishment, no matter who the criminal is or how terrible the crime.

Capital punishment degrades the authorities who impose it even more than the person who suffers it.

The first day of the year is World Day of Peace. Each year, a papal peace message is published. The opening words of Pope Benedict XVI's message read:

At the beginning of the new year, I wish to extend prayerful good wishes for peace to Governments, leaders of nations and all men and women of good will. In a special way, I invoke peace upon all those experiencing pain and suffering, those living under the threat of violence and armed aggression, and those who await their human and social emancipation, having had their dignity trampled upon. I invoke peace upon children, who by their innocence enrich humanity with goodness and hope, and by their sufferings compel us all to work for justice and peace. Out of concern for children, especially those whose future is compromised by exploitation and the malice of unscrupulous adults, I wish on this World Day of Peace to encourage everyone to reflect on the theme: The Human Person, the Heart of Peace. I am convinced that respect for the person promotes peace and that, in building peace, the foundations are laid for an authentic integral humanism. In this way a serene future is prepared for coming generations.

Resolving to live as a Christian in today's society is a challenge that faces us every day of our lives. To be a follower of Christ means to resolve to change our minds, our hearts, and our lives, resolving to discern not our own wills and desires, but God's. We are continually challenged to embrace change by growing stronger in our faith, by participating more regularly in the life of the Church, and by reaching out to others with compassion and love.

As we move into this new year of 2007,

may we grow into a new way of living and being for ourselves,

our loved ones and our world.

May we become more human,

acting with justice, intelligence, common sense and mercy.

May we become more like the God who is.

May we BE Christian.

HOLY SEE REAFFIRMS DEATH PENALTY STANCE

Jesuit Father Federico Lombardi, director of the Vatican press office, reaffirmed the Vatican's condemnation of the death penalty in the wake of the execution of former Iraqi dictator Sadaam Hussein. Father Lombardi said: 'To kill the guilty one is not the way to rebuild justice and to reconcile society. The risk also exists that, on the contrary, the spirit of vengeance will be fuelled and new violence be sown ... one cannot but hope that all those responsible will make every effort so that in a dramatic situation channels of reconciliation and peace will finally be opened.' TIME TO END SCANDAL OF HUNGER, BENEDICT SAYS

In his annual New Year address to the Vatican diplomatic community, Pope Benedict condemned a worsening 'scandal of famine' which he said is 'unacceptable in a world which has the means and knowledge to tackle it'. The Pope urged the Western world to help by 'accelerating the process of cancelling or reducing the debt of the poorest countries'. This should be done without imposing structural reform measures which would be 'disastrous for the most vulnerable populations', Pope Benedict added. Refer: http://www.cathnews.com/news/701/43.php

POPE BENEDICT XVI APPEALS FOR PEACE IN THE MIDDLE EAST

Pope Benedict has referred to the need for 'new ways of rationality' following the recent outbursts of violence in Lebanon and between Hamas and Fatah forces in Gaza. The Pope appealed for dialogue, saying he was saddened by the pain inflicted on the Lebanese and Palestinians populations. 'I feel immense pain for that dear population, and I know that many Lebanese face the temptation of abandoning all hope,' the Pope said. Religious leaders representing three thousand Catholic nuns today pledged their support for Indigenous people in November 2006, on the 20th Anniversary of Pope John Paul II's address to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people in Alice Springs. The Sisters of St Joseph and the Sisters of Mercy throughout Australia have resolved to stand with Aboriginal people in their struggle for basic human rights.

Sr Katrina Brill, a Congregational Leader of the Sisters of St Joseph speaking in conjunction with Sr Caroline Ryan, Vice-President of the Institute of Sisters of Mercy of Australia said 'We call on all people of good will in this country to ensure that every Australian has, by right, a standard of living commensurate with citizenship in a developed country. After all, where one person is diminished, all are diminished.'

Mining companies modern "Trojans", says Filipino bishop

Denouncing mining companies working in the Philippines as modern-day Trojan horses, Filipino Bishop Zacarias Jimenez endorsed a major Columban-commissioned report which accused the country of being "among the worst countries in the world" for various mining practices.

Benedict appeals again to end Mid-East violence

Reacting to deadly clashes between supporters and opponents of Lebanon's government and between Hamas and Fatah forces in Gaza, Pope Benedict renewed his appeal for an end to violence in the region while empising the need for "new ways of rationality".

Catholic social justice advocates prominent in honours list

The Adelaide archdiocese's Vicar-General Msgr David Cappo, Melbourne Jesuit Fr Peter Norden and several Vinnies workers, including Loreto Sister Toni Matha, were among the prominent Catholics cited in this year's Australia Day Honours.

Pakistan to loosen blasphemy laws

A senior Pakistani government official indicated that the country's harsh blasphemy laws, which Christians and rights groups say are used by Muslims to oppress minorities, will be modified after the forthcoming national elections.

Drop all charges against Hicks: bishop said

Welcoming news that charges against Guantanamo prisoner David Hicks may be downgraded, Australian Catholic Social Justice Council chief, Bishop Christopher Saunders said that respect for natural justice should lead prosecutors to drop all charges against him.

Payment cuts to pregnant woman not on: Catholic welfare chief

Withdrawing welfare payments was not the way to help people into jobs, Catholic Social Services director, Francis Quinlan, said after reports emerged of a four-months pregnant unemployed woman whose welfare payments were cut off for eight weeks for breaching Centrelink requirements.

Catholic groups mobilise for world forum

Christian lay leaders cannot work separately from mainstream justice lobby groups, said a Bangladeshi Catholic youth leader, explaining why so many Catholics are involved in the massive World Social Forum gathering of civil groups being held this week in Nairobi, Kenya.

Vinnies launches drought appeal for NSW farmers

With drought affecting 93% of NSW, the St Vincent de Paul Society launched an urgent appeal for drought victims who face stress and "are also feeling the knock-on effects of the drought."

Toowoomba diocese welcomes Tamworth refugee about face

Toowoomba diocese social justice coordinator, Dr Mark Copland, welcomed an about-face by Tamworth Regional Council over an earlier decision to refuse to relocate Sudanese refugee families to the north-western NSW centre.

Sydney parish battles DIMIA over deportation

The Catholic Social Justice Group of Manly parish on Sydney's North Shore was campaigning on behalf of a Muslim Pakistani who lived in Australia for 19 years but who faces deportation after a visa mix-up.

Benedict calls on Jews, Christians to cooperate for peace

Speaking at his Wednesday general audience, Pope Benedict called for Christians and Jews to respect and appreciate each other and to cooperate for justice and peace in the world.

Jerusalem Christian leaders offer to mediate for Palestinians

Warning that warring Palestinian factions could trigger a civil war, Christian church leaders in Jerusalem are urging an end to the violence and offering to play a mediating role between Hamas and Fatah.

Don't cry for Saddam: Pell

Saddam Hussein was in the "front rank of evildoers", Sydney Archbishop George Pell said in his newspaper column, adding that although the Church opposes capital punishment he did not weep for the executed Iraqi dictator.

Pope calls for legal migration and family reunion measures

Lamenting the "painful" condition of many migrants, refugees and exiles, Pope Benedict called for recognition of the difficulties of migrant families and concrete measures to favour their legal immigration and to keep families united.

Cowra family in last minute immigration reprieve

A family of Taiwanese origin whose children attend the local Catholic school in Cowra, central NSW, have won a last minute review of an Immigration Department decision ordering the family to leave the country because their small organic farm is not profitable enough.

Tamworth priest slams "heartless" Council refugee decision

Parish priest of St Nicholas, Tamworth, Fr Richard Gleeson said that the council's decision to stop the NSW city from becoming a resettlement centre for refugees is "heartless".

Beer slab donation not enough to make poverty history

Compared to money spent on Christmas, Caritas Australia chief Jack de Groot said that Australians can do a lot better to alleviate poverty than the \$43 average donation - the price of a slab of beer - to development agencies in 2005.

Townsville Church concern over Palm Island decision

Townsville Church leaders are concerned about the impact on Indigenous communities of the decision not to prosecute a Queensland police officer over the death of Palm Island man Mulrunji Doomadgee.

Church leaders petition Tamworth over refugee decision

Leaders from the Anglican, Catholic and Uniting churches have met with the Tamworth mayor in a bid to convince the council to keep an open mind on the resettlement of refugees after it last week refused to resettle five Sudanese refugee families in the NSW town.

Mining to blame for typhoon deaths, Filipino priest says

Landslides caused by mining methods were to blame for the deaths of 13 parishioners at a parish on Rapu Rapu island, Philippines, a local priest said, but a representative of Australian-managed Lafayette Mining denied the claims.

No sanctions for Fiji, Archbishop pleads

Fiji Archbishop Petero Mataca appealed to the international community to either lift or postpone sanctions against the Pacific island nation, saying they may serve to strengthen sympathy for last week's military coup.

Citizenship test harsh, exploitative

Sydney's vicar for immigration slammed the Government's proposed citizenship test, saying it could "exploit those who are disadvantaged", while the bishops' spokesman on migration issues, Bishop Joseph Grech said Australia's bishops are opposed to the test.

Stop Darfur violence, Holy See tells UN

The Holy See called on United Nations members to act immediately to stop the horrific violence in Sudan's Darfur region, including killing of children, rape of girls and burning of villages.

Mercy award to Brisbane justice and peace worker

The Mercy Foundation made its annual social justice award to Peter Arndt of the Brisbane Catholic Justice and Peace Commission in recognition of his work to bring an Indigenous Australian perspective to the Commission's work.

Faith communities unite on climate change

Representatives of organisations from 16 Australian faith communities will launch a statement of common belief on climate change in what is described as a world first show of interfaith unity on the issue.

Try Hicks or bring him home, Bishops tell Govt

Describing as "unacceptable" the situation of David Hicks, who now been imprisoned in Guantanamo Bay for five years, Australia's bishops say that if Hicks a case to answer he should be tried without further delay.
