FROM THE SECRETARIAT

Dear Friends,

Social Justice Sunday - 27 September

As Social Justice Sunday approaches, now is the time to place your orders for the Australian Catholic Bishops' Statement. Social Justice Sunday is celebrated on 27 September. The title of this year's Social Justice Sunday Statement is 'And You Will Be My Witnesses: Young people and justice'.

Bishop Christopher Saunders, Chairman of the ACSJC, reflecting on the experience of World Youth Day in Sydney during 2008 says, 'There is a challenge for youth and for all of us wrapped up in this wonderful joy and enthusiasm for the Spirit. It is the challenge to persevere in our calling, to remember that as Christians we are a new creation, part of a holy world in which God is not eclipsed or deemed irrelevant

by a secularist ideology, as the Holy Father reminded us. We are called to persevere in witnessing to the magnificence of God's love for us, to act justly in his name and to be agents of hope and peace.'

He emphasises two threads running through this year's Social Justice Sunday Statement. 'The first is the legacy of World Youth Day 2008 and its theme, which tells of the power that the Holy Spirit confers on us and its continuing inspiration. The second thread is the consciousness of how many young people experience deprivation and prejudice in Australia and overseas. As the Statement points out, young people are among the strongest fighters in the cause of justice, but at the same time, they can be among the most vulnerable to injustice.

'This Statement is about youth, but it is for all of us. As the Bishops say, the power the Spirit gives us is the power to change - to change ourselves and in so doing to change the world. As Catholics, we know that that power to change also gives us the responsibility to work for justice and to live and embody the message of the Gospel in everything we do in our lives', Bishops Saunders says.

In this year's Social Justice Sunday Statement, the Catholic Bishops of Australia support young people's commitment to social justice and reassert the central theme of World Youth Day:

You will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you will be my witnesses. (Acts 1:8)

The Bishops remind all Catholics of Pope Benedict's challenge during that week:

What will you leave to the next generation? Are you building your lives on firm foundations, building something that will endure? Are you living your lives in a way that opens up space for the Spirit in the midst of a world that wants to forget God, or even rejects him in the name of a falsely-conceived freedom? How are you using the gifts you have been given, the 'power' which the Holy Spirit is even now prepared to release within you? What legacy will you leave to young people yet to come? What difference will you make?

The earliest Christians were young women and men who received the Holy Spirit, then went forth to spread the Good News and to care for the most vulnerable. Many young Australians, too, witness to the Gospel as 'ambassadors of hope', as the Pope called them, using their gifts in the service of justice.

Some young people, however, face injustices that prevent them taking up the challenge, leaving them disempowered, excluded and deprived of basic dignity. Of many such issues, the Bishops discuss four: the plight of Indigenous youth, those excluded from employment, the issue of mental health and the prevention of abuse. They also discuss two international concerns: the environment and global justice and development.

At the beginning of his ministry, Jesus tells us that he is sent 'to bring the good news to the poor' and 'to set the downtrodden free' (*Luke* 4:18-21). After his Resurrection, he offers his disciples peace and gives them the gift of the Holy Spirit - the spirit of justice, a core tenet of Christian life and faith.

We seek to enhance the reign of God in our land through forging reconciliation, acting for justice and making peace. We are all bound into the struggle for justice - to see, to judge and to act - and challenged to go forth in the peace of the Holy Spirit, to love and serve the Lord.

CREATING A SUSTAINABLE NATIONAL REPRESENTATIVE BODY INDIGENOUS PEOPLES

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Social Justice Commissioner Tom Calma has released the long awaited Report - Our future in our hands - Creating a sustainable National Representative Body for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples, which outlines the model designed and developed from 12 months of intensive consultations with Indigenous peoples. In December 2008, Mr Calma was asked by Minister Macklin to convene an independent Indigenous Steering Committee to undertake consultations and develop a model. The establishment of such a body is the most significant step in reconciliation and resetting the relationship between government and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples since the National Apology. UN INTERNATIONAL DAY FOR PEACE - 21 SEPTEMBER

The International Day of Peace, observed each year on 21 September, is a global call for ceasefire and non-violence. It is a time to reflect on the horror and cost of war and the benefits of peacefully resolving our disputes. This year, UN Secretary-General is using the day to ask governments and citizens of the world to focus on the important issues of nuclear disarmament and non-proliferation. Ban Ki-moon says, 'we must build on this momentum. ... I am launching the WMD-WeMustDisarm! Campaign. ... Between now and 21 September, we will issue 100 reasons to disarm, via Twitter, MySpace, Facebook, email, text message, radio and from friend-to-friend.

As we observe the International Day of Peace with world leaders gathered in New York for the 64th Session of the United Nations General Assembly, I will proclaim one strong, simple message: We Must Disarm!' Principal of the Anglican theological Ridley College, Dr Peter Adam, said Christians must consider appropriate recompense to Australia's Aboriginal peoples, who suffered European colonisation, church planting and nation-building.

Some 14,500 people signed a petition organised by the Mary MacKillop East Timor Mission supporting the nomination of Timor-Leste for the award of Companion of the Order of Australia (Honorary). It will be presented to parliament next month.
